

# Thoughts From Our Pastoral Associate



Dear friends in faith,

As we await the return of our pastor from Kenya, the inauguration of the next President of the United States, and the myriad changes a new calendar year promises, I reflect on the words of Jan Richardson, the poet, "For Those Who Have Far to Travel,"

If you could see the journey whole, you might never undertake it, might never dare the first step that propels you from the place you have known toward the place you know not.

Indeed we stand on the verge of many new beginnings, and, like you, I ask whether I am living the life, making the choices, taking the actions that bring me closer to God.

I find myself humbled and awed as I read the biography of Sr. Maura Clarke. In the early 1980's, I knew vaguely of the 4 women murdered in El Salvador after the assassination of Oscar Romero, but I didn't know details of her life until I read A Radical Faith. In recent years, I have made friends who named their children, Maura and Oscar, in homage to these brave people. It's empowering and reassuring to read that this nun was so human and asked, "If we abandon the people when they are suffering the crucifixion, how can we speak credibly about Resurrection?" (p. 215). Her life and times are not so different from our own.

As Jan Richardson insightfully points out, we likely hesitate if we saw the entire road ahead. We don't know what the new year, new Presidency, changes in Chicago, in Illinois, or at St. Catherine of Siena - St. Lucy hold in store. But, we do know that God took human form so "that they might have life, and have it abundantly!" (John 10:10).

Please join me on Sun., Jan. 22 at 2 pm in our beautiful church to hear about Sr. Maura Clarke, a remarkable woman of faith. We will be inspired by her example to ask, "How can I be the hands and feet of Jesus today?"

# The story of a 20<sup>th</sup> Century Martyr: Sr. Maura Clarke MM NEXT SUNDAY, January 22 at 2PM at St. Catherine-St. Lucy Church

Join members of Sr. Maura's family and Eileen Markey, the author of a recently published biography of Maura Clarke entitled "A Radical Faith," on Sunday, Jan 22 at 2PM at St. Catherine-St. Lucy Church, 38 N. Austin Blvd in Oak Park to honor the story and faith journey of this remarkable women. Sr. Maura entered the convent in 1950, was assigned to Central America, and assumed the traditional ministry of teaching and preparing children for their sacraments. Affected by the quantum shift in religious life brought on by the Second Vatican Council, she eventually moved into a ministry of accompanying people in their daily struggles and the formation of Base Christian Communities. She was murdered along with three other American religious women in December 1980 in El Salvador for their work in accompanying and supporting refugees from that ongoing and devastating civil war. EILEEN MARKEY THE ASSASSINATION OF SISTER MAURA

She tells much more than the story of an American missionary caught up in the violence of Central America. A Radical Faith is very much the "story of a soul" -- the human and spiritual journey of an American woman religious from her Irish-American childhood in Queens, N.Y., to a life of missionary accompaniment with the people of Nicaragua and El Salvador. There, she left the traditional ministry of teaching to move to Managua for a ministry of accompanying people and the formation of basic Christian communities she experienced the Second Vatican Council quantum shift in religious life.



#### JANUARY 22, 2017— 3RD SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

First Reading: Isaiah 8:23-9, 3

Zebulun and Naphtali were two Jewish tribes who had settled in the northern area of the Holy Land. Eight centuries before Christ, this area experienced a bitter defeat at the hands of Assyria. The prophet Isaiah offers these defeated people hope by looking ahead to a day when they would be especially blessed. The northern area of the Holy Land was later known as Galilee, and Christians have seen Jesus as fulfilling this prophecy.

# Second Reading: 1 Corinthians 1:10-13, 17

In his first letter to the Corinthians, Paul deals with issues the Church faces in every age. After Paul had founded this community and moved on, he heard of polarizations among the Corinthian Christians. In this passage, he speaks bluntly to them about these divisions.

#### **Treasures From Our Tradition**

As soon as Christmas ends, people begin planning for Easter! Originally, the source of our Paschal Triduum was but a single liturgy extending from Saturday sundown to sunrise on Easter Sunday. The two days leading up to the liturgy were days of fast, not only for the elect, but for the church preparing to baptize them. A fifth-century pope explained that the church imitated the apostles, who were in hiding with their grief from the arrest of Jesus, and therefore sacraments, even penance, were forbidden.

Inevitably, though, people wanted to come together, and so eventually a Liturgy of the Word developed for Good Friday. This was the first step toward today's shape of the Triduum, and gradually new ideas were embraced, including the veneration of the cross and a simple Communion service. Interestingly, the Word remained central, since we know that in those days the pope did not receive Communion at this liturgy, even though the faithful had that option. In the other churches of Rome, priests and people received Communion under both species. Although the custom of Communion on Good Friday took hold, it did not endure past the Middle Ages. The central liturgies of the year slowly unraveled and disappeared from parish life. Remember that there were no seminaries in those days, and books were a rare luxury. Most priests could only manage to celebrate a simple "low" Mass, and few parishes could afford the ritual books that would guide a priest through the complex forms. Holy Week remained important in private devotion, but for a time the liturgies virtually disappeared.

### **Mercy Challenge**

Continue to be a sign of God's mercy in this world by actively being like the Good Samaritan: feeding the hungry, giving drink to the thirsty, sheltering the homeless, clothing the naked, visiting the sick and imprisoned, burying the dead, and/or giving alms to the poor.

Be committed to being Christ for others in your world, by helping your neighbors with their emotional and spiritual needs. Using your particular gifts, find ways to instruct the unknowing, counsel the doubtful, admonish sinners, bear wrongs patiently, forgive offenses, console the afflicted, and/or pray for the living and the dead.

#### **Three Missions**

Today we begin with one of the "servant songs" from the book of Isaiah, a song prophetic of Jesus' ministry of service. Isaiah's mission is not only to bring back the children of Jacob to gather in Israel; it is also to be "a light to the nations" (Isaiah 49:6). Jesus Christ, as servant, will be the fulfillment of the ancient prophecy and the basis of the new.

This Sunday we begin a series of readings from Paul's letter to the Corinthians. Here Paul is identified by his mission: he is an apostle of Jesus Christ. The church at Corinth to whom he addresses this letter is also identified: it is part of the universal church of God. The Corinthians are called to holiness, as are all Christians.

Though the feast of the Baptism of the Lord was celebrated last Monday, today's Gospel also alludes to the importance of that event. The reading emphasizes that Jesus "outranks" John: his baptism in the Spirit will eradicate sin. Jesus accepts John's baptism, even though it is he himself who is the Lamb of God.
