

Thoughts From Our Pastor



Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

Over the past one month, we have celebrated some of the most significant feasts in the Catholic Church beginning with Ascension of Christ, Pentecost, Trinity, and the Body and Blood of Christ. In these feasts, we have come to learn and deepen our understanding of who God is to us and what He has done for us. He sent His own Son to come and live with us. How do you feel that God decided out of sheer and unconditional love to send His Son? The Son of God was willing to lay down his life for you and for me. This

is a huge deal, my brothers and sisters in Christ. Whether we like it or not, Jesus died for everyone. When He ascended to heaven, after completing his mission, the Father and His Son sent the Holy Spirit to us; and of all the gifts given to mankind by Him, there is none greater than the presence of the Holy Spirit. The Holy Spirit takes up permanent residence in the hearts of believers (Romans 8:9; 1 Corinthians 6:19-20). Jesus gave the Spirit as a "compensation" for His absence, to perform the functions for us which He would have done if He had remained personally with us.

Among those spiritual functions is that of the revealer of truth. The Spirit's presence within us enables us to understand and interpret God's Word. Jesus told His disciples that "when He, the Spirit of Truth, comes, He will guide you into all truth" (John 16:13). He reveals to our minds the whole counsel of God as it relates to worship, doctrine, and Christian living. He is the ultimate guide, going before us, leading the way, removing obstructions, opening the understanding of the Bible, and making all things plain and clear. He leads in the way we should go in spiritual things. Without such a guide, we would be apt to fall into error. The Spirit convinces us of Christ's divinity and Incarnation; His being the Messiah; His suffering and death; His resurrection and ascension; and His exaltation at the right hand of God.

As many of us begin to prepare for summer vacations and plans, please remember that God never takes vacation or rest like we do. He wants to nourish us constantly with His Body and Blood, and the only way He can do for us is by our going to Mass. I encourage you to attend Mass regularly. I also encourage everyone to register and continue to make use of our online offertory giving. Please check the "GIFT CENTRAL" link on our parish website.

Finally, as we continue with the summer season, I want to thank all our volunteers who have worked in different capacities during this past year. I am very grateful to you for sharing with our community your gifts of time, talent and treasure.

May God continue to bless each of you daily.

JULY 2, 2017 -13th SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

First Reading: 2 Kings 4:8-11, 14-16

Elisha, who lived about 800 years before Christ, succeeded the great prophet Elijah, and was noted for his miraculous deeds. Today we hear of one such deed performed in gratitude for the hospitality given to him and his servant Gehazi.

Second Reading: Romans 6:3-4, 8-11

(Today and for many Sundays hereafter, our second reading will be taken from Paul's letter to the Romans.)

In a previous section of his letter to the Romans, Paul taught that we sinners are reconciled to God through the deathe and resurrection of Jesus. Now Paul notes that we experience this dying and rising when, in the immersion form of baptism, we are symbolically "buried" in the water and emerge to new life.

Sts. Peter and Paul, Apostles

On June 29 the Church celebrates the feast day of Sts. Peter & Paul. Together, the two saints are the founders of the See of Rome, through their preaching, ministry and martyrdom there.

<u>St. Peter</u>, who was named Simon, was a fisherman of Galilee. Jesus gave him the name Cephas (Petrus in Latin), which means 'Rock,' because he was to become the rock upon which Christ would build His Church.



The Acts of the Apostles illustrates his role as head of the Church after the Resurrection and Ascension of Christ. Peter led the Apostles as the first Pope and ensured that the disciples kept the true faith. St. Peter spent his last years in Rome, leading the Church through persecution and eventually being martyred in the year 64. He was crucified upside-down at his own request, because he claimed he was not worthy to die as his Lord. He was buried on Vatican hill, and St. Peter's Basilica is built over his tomb.

St. Paul, was the Apostle of the Gentiles. His letters are included in the writings of the New Testament, and through them we learn much about his life and the faith of the early Church. Before receiving the name Paul, he was Saul, a Jewish pharisee who zealously persecuted Christians in Jerusalem. Saul's conversion took place as he was on his way to Damascus to persecute the Christian community there. As he was traveling along the road, he was suddenly surrounded by a great light from heaven. He was blinded and fell off his horse. He then heard a voice saying to him, "Saul, Saul, why do you persecute me?" He answered: "Who are you, Lord?" Christ said: "I am Jesus, whom you are persecuting." Saul continued to Damascus, where he was baptized and his sight was restored. He took the name Paul and spent the remainder of his life preaching the Gospel tirelessly to the Gentiles of the Mediterranean world. Paul was imprisoned and taken to Rome, where he was beheaded in the year 67. He is buried in Rome in the Basilica of St. Paul Outside the Walls.

June HIV Awareness Days



Treasures From Our Tradition

The Eucharistic Prayers at the heart of our liturgy have a long history, beginning with the extemporaneous prayers of the early Christians. The presiders gave thanks from their hearts, not from any prearranged text, over the gifts of bread and wine. When the assembly had the sense that enough was said, someone would call out "Amen!" and that was that. For the most part, the plan flowed directly from Jewish meal prayers, which always recalled God's mighty deeds. Some other markers and signposts were added almost everywhere fairly early, like the presider's call to attention: "Lift up your hearts!"

Scholars have provided us with translations of many early texts. These have actually helped us craft new liturgical prayers, because until the liturgical reforms of forty years ago, no one could recall any prayer but the Roman Canon, now called Eucharistic Prayer I. For hundreds of years in the West, it was our only Eucharistic Prayer, and it was only in Latin. But the history of our Eucharistic Prayers is amazingly fruitful, and models have come down to us that have yielded new insights and expressions. The old custom of improvising texts according to a master plan has not endured, but we have now rediscovered a plan of standardizing the text while allowing for a great variety.
