Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

Some 2000 years ago, Mary Magdalene exclaimed: "The Lord has been taken from the tomb! We don't know where they have put him." Precisely from that historic moment, Christians have lived lives of faith and hope. In fact, Mary's arrival at the tomb of Jesus is the first accounting of resurrection hope in our world. Today, we cry "Alleluia, he is risen," bridging the millennia with this self-same resurrection faith and hope.

In today's Gospel passage from St. John the Evangelist, again, we learn, that it is only with the eyes of faith that we can understand and experience something of the resurrection of Jesus. We are told that John "saw and believed."

Though our Lord's resurrection was God's merciful gift of love for all people of all times, on this joyful Easter Day, we awoke to a world where, for many, this is a gift far removed from their experiences. Who do I mean? Most obviously, there are those of us who are struggling in a variety of ways due to this pandemic that continues to grip our world. Some are grieving. Others have lost their jobs. Still others have been separated so long now from their loved ones, that the past year has led to a depth of sadness and depression. This day in the world, there are also men, women and children who are yet experiencing the ravages of war. There are people who suffer physical, social, spiritual, emotional, ethnic, racial and gender-related injustices. For them, and for so many others, these are very real obstacles or challenges to people's faithfulness and hopefulness. For them and for all who live without hope, the stone has yet to be rolled away.

Admittedly, I am new to your faith community, but those of you who make up this wonderful community of St. Catherine/St. Lucy, though perhaps not strangers to some of life's hardships, are also a people who awaken each morning to many of life's gifts. For most of us, resurrection faith is more easily come by than for so many others in our world. Of course, to whom much is given, much more is demanded. As we rejoice in the resurrection of Jesus this Easter, let us remember that the resurrection of our Lord is a gift given to us all. Let us remember, too, that the degree to which we share this gift with those who feel the burden of the stone that has yet to be rolled away, is the degree to which the resurrection truly is ours.

May the peace of our Lord's resurrection be with you this Easter and always, and may we ever share this gift with those who suffer and find life burdensome, so that they too, with the eyes of faith, may see and believe.

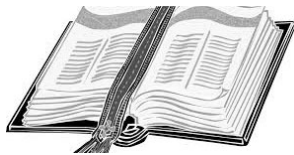

**APRIL 11, 2021 —
DIVINE MERCY SUNDAY**

First Reading: Acts 4:32-35

Luke wrote a two-volume work: Volume One was his Gospel; Volume Two was the Acts of the Apostles which describes the life of the Church after the Resurrection of Jesus. Every year, during the seven weeks of the Easter Season, the first reading is taken from the Acts of the Apostles. In today's passage, Luke gives an idealized description of early Christian community life.

Second Reading: 1 John 5:1-6

Today and for the remaining Sundays of the Easter Season, our second reading will be taken from the first letter of John. It was written about 100 A.D., and is one of the last New Testament books to be composed. This letter was written in the tradition of the apostle John and thus bears his name. Today's passage fro near the end of this brief letter treats the fundamentals of Christian life: faith, love, and the commandments.

Easter Welcome to All

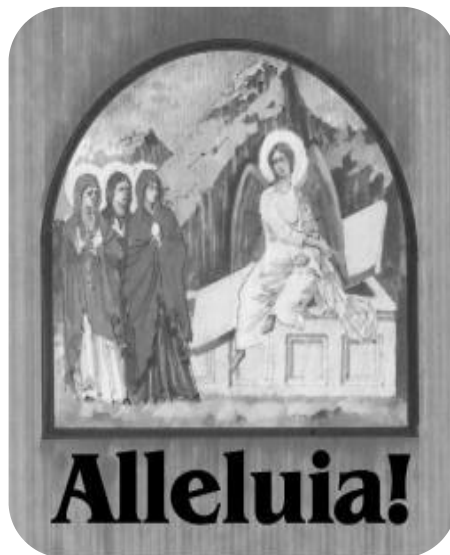
Happy Easter! Alleluia! To all who are celebrating Easter this weekend at St. Catherine-St. Lucy, may you all know the joy of the presence of the Risen Christ in your hearts. For all who may be returning to our parish or are visiting this weekend, we warmly welcome you. Welcome home also, to all our college students; make sure you go back to school with full Easter Baskets!

The Parish is Open for Masses

As you know, St. Catherine-St. Lucy has passed certification by the Archdiocese of Chicago to begin offering public Masses on a limited basis. SCSL parishioners are encouraged to update us with your current e-mail in order to receive the weekly notifications of our reopened Sunday Masses and other liturgies as they are scheduled. Each email will contain the link that is needed to sign up in our reservation system on *SignUp-Genius*. **NOTICE:** We wanted to let everyone know that if you sign-up for Mass after Friday, they will not be on the sign-up sheets.

- ..#Please come 15 minutes before mass starts.
- ..#Enter the church by Austin Blvd. only.
- ..#Exit the church by Washington Blvd. only.
- ..#Mandatorily wear a mask.
- ..#Your hands will be sanitized once you enter the church.
- ..#Sign-up at the entrance.
- ..#From this weekend on, entrance to Sacristy's bathroom is prohibited.
- ..#You will be assigned where to sit within the church.
- ..#No congregational singing.
- ..#Avoid touching the pews.
- ..#Follow the signs inside the church.
- ..#Please sit on the pews that are marked.
- ..#No Sign of Peace is permitted.
- ..#You will receive a Worship Aid, which will be discarded after each mass.
- ..#Communion will be received only on your hands.
- ..#After Mass, sanitize your hands.
- ..#You are NOT allowed to gather or stay in church after mass.

These guidelines were developed by the Catholic Conference of Bishops of Illinois, based on the State of Illinois



“How Come We Didn’t See Anyone Baptized or Received into the Church At the Easter Vigil?”

This is a question which may be on your mind and, like most questions, it is a good one. It is because it means that our Faith Community is aware of what we do as a sacramental people. But also we are seeing the results of all the restrictions we have had because of COVID 19.

It’s also a great question because it helps make us conscious of another aspect of our role as the People of God: to share the Good News of Jesus. Let’s look at both “goods.” Sometimes folks come to us to find out what to do to “become” Catholic, sometimes they don’t. This is one of those years in which folks didn’t! The working of the Holy Spirit “blows where it will” in God’s good time. But we (and here is the second “good”) as a Faith Community are privileged to be able to “assist” the Holy Spirit. When we invite folks to meet us for our weekend Liturgies, when we talk to them about their experience afterward, when we invite them to join us at parish events or when we encourage conversations about “inquiring” about the Church, we are doing our part in assisting the Holy Spirit.

Easter Time

Easter is a good time to recommit ourselves to a simpler lifestyle – concentrating more of our efforts on what God wants from us and less of our efforts on what we want for ourselves. Jesus sacrificed everything for us. What can we sacrifice, not just at Lent, but every day, so that we can better serve Our Lord?

Rejoice and Be Glad

During the first three or four centuries of Christianity, if you asked a Christian to name the feast days of the church, your answer would have been a puzzled stare, for there was only one feast: the Resurrection of the Lord. Every Sunday was a feast celebrating the one great feast. Even though our calendar now has many beautiful and holy feasts, we must continually be called back to the fact that all these other feasts exist because of the feast of Christ’s passover from death to life. The psalm today proclaims this message well: “This is the day.” It is not one of many days, but it is the day of all days, the one that gives all the others their origin, purpose, meaning, and destiny. Listen carefully to Peter’s speech in Acts with its recollection of the Passion, to the words of the apostle Paul, and to the account of Mary Magdalene, John, and Peter finding the empty tomb, and you will hear the many wonderful works that God has done for us through Christ. Rejoice and be glad!

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Food for Thought

The Mind of Christ

*This is the day the Lord has made;
Let us rejoice and be glad. (Psalm 118:24)*

*Paul grew gradually into understanding
and integrating what Jesus' resurrection
meant to him, to Jesus' friends, and for mankind.
Midst glowing candles, ringing bells, and Alleluias,
the readings say there's more for us to comprehend;
Saints say it's a lifetime for Christ's resurrection to unwind.*

*Paul says baptism conveys an irrevocable writ
of freedom and vision, with no expiration date.
It is a seedling growing into life's beautiful chord.
Paul invites us to a whole new way of thinking and acting;
Our way of perceiving life colors all we do.
Paul calls this putting on the mind of the Risen Lord.*

*Jesus' gospel called people to a faith-based life:
The reign of God is near. Putting on the mind of Christ
is a further step: open oneself to a gentle prod
from the unique vantage point of the Risen Lord,
the Historical Jesus who is now at the right hand of God.
Transformed, he knows himself as the Risen Son of God.*

*"They put him to death by hanging him on a tree.
This man God raised on the third day and God
granted that he be visible ...to us,
the witnesses chosen by God."* (Acts 10:39-41)
