

THE MEANING OF DISCIPLESHIP

The geography of today's Gospel is significant. Jesus is completing his ministry in Galilee and beginning his journey to Jerusalem, where he will meet both death and resurrection. The prediction of his death placed here is the second of three in Mark's Gospel, and as usual it is the occasion for an important teaching on the part of Jesus. Today that lesson is tied to the need for his disciples to embrace a ministry of service. A play on words in Aramaic would have linked the words "child" and "servant," thus turning Jesus' gesture of placing a child in their midst into an illustration of his understanding of himself as the Servant of the Lord. It is that same awareness of the meaning of their ministry that Jesus (and Mark) wishes to instill in the disciples. Theirs must be a ministry of service if they are to follow in the footsteps of Jesus. And that service might even require of them that they be "handed over" to death. What would have been-in the culture of Jesus' day-an ordinary discussion of social status ("who is the greatest") becomes in Mark's context a key insight into the meaning of discipleship for the disciples and for us.

500 Club Certificates

500 Club UPDATE

We have completed the mailing for the 2021-22 season of the 500 Club! If you are a registered member of the parish or a current certificate owner, you hopefully received all the information about the next season of the 500 Club. The new season begins October 31st, 2021 and continues through the end of June, 2022. It is a shorter "season" this time to align it with the fiscal year. The weekly prize, however, will be larger.

The cost of certificates remains at \$25 each and they are eligible to win a prize every weekend in the season that you own them. In the 2021-22 season the prize each weekend will be \$35 except for three weekends when the prize is \$500. The drawing on the first Sunday of the season, October 31st, will be for \$500. If we sell all 500 certificates that are available during the season, we will have a fourth drawing for \$500 replacing one of the \$35 drawings.

Just a reminder, our current season of the 500 Club continues with weekly drawings through October 17th, 2021. We can't thank you enough for your continued support of the parish through this fun and socially distanced program. We have raised \$10,758 during the 2020-2021 season with the sale of 446 certificates.

Thank you again for your enthusiastic participation, especially as we are not able to resume some of our previous and helpful fundraising events at this time. Proceeds will be put toward the general operating expenses of the parish.

In response, God had directed Moses to gather 70 elders around the meeting tent to receive a share in the administrative burdens. Today's passage picks it up from there.

Second Reading: James 5: I-6Today we conclude our series of five readings from the letter of James. A major concern in this letter is social justice. Today, the author delivers a blistering attack, reminiscent of some of the Old Testament prophets

Food for Thought

James the Apostle (Letter continued from 9/12)

James' Chapter Three begins with a section on Abuses of the Tongue. Anyone who does not offend in word has perfection. (2) Although the tongue's a little member, it can boast mightily. It is a fire, the very world of iniquity. (5&6) (James gets a bit carried away here.) The tongue no man can tame. A restless evil, full of deadly poison. (Wow! That's a weapon!) With it we praise our God and Father, and curse a man made in the image of God. (8&9) From the same mouth—blessing and cursing. (10) After tongue abuse, James covers True Wisdom. Words like peaceable and moderate, docile, chaste, in harmony with all good things, meekness, full of mercy and good fruitsall describe the wisdom that is from above. But if your heart's full of jealousy and contentiousness, do not glory in it. (14&17) The fruit of justice is sown in peace, by those who make peace and judge fairly. (18)

Chapter Four opens with commentary on the Sources of Discord. So James asks where do wars and quarrels come from among you? Basically it's your passion for things that you covet and do not have, and so you quarrel, wrangle, and kill—the Spirit that dwells in you covets into jealousy. (1,2,5) But the Spirit gives a greater grace; It says that God resists the proud, and gives grace to the humble. (6) So draw near to God, and he will draw near to you. Humble yourselves in God's sight, and he will exalt you. (8&10) The section on All Life Depends on God's Will says if we plan some future action, we should add "If the Lord will," now "God willing." (15)

Chapter Five begins with James scolding The Unjust Rich for withholding the wages of field laborers. T'was ever thus. (4) He then recommends Patience in Affliction, pointing out how farmers are patient awaiting their crops; patience strengthens the heart.(8) James gives prophets as an example of labor and patience; we call them blessed who have endured. (10) He then brings the tongue back into conversation with "Do not swear." (11) In Last Anointing, if you're sad, sing. If sick, confess, and be anointed with oil. This was a big step: promulgating the sacrament Extreme Unction for the sick. (14-16) Finally, James says if we bring back a sinner from his misguided ways, it will save our soul from death, and will cover a multitude of sins. (19&20) (That sounds like a deal!)




Zoom Book Discussion at Ascension
